Pig in a blanket proves that art can be a boar

IF GOLDILOCKS came upon this in the dead of night in a Melbourne winter she'd have a conniption.

In Tul Suwannakit's Mi Casa Su Casa — on display at a Collingwood gallery — a dead wild pig snuggles into bed, smiling, in a dimly lit

"It's supposed to be sarcastic and tongue in cheek ... when you look at it you're questioning whether unexpected guests could walk in and make themselves right at home," said Suwannakit, an RMIT graduate and childcare

While other artists have studios scattered with paints and canvas, his workspace boasts a freezer full to the brim of dead animals.

"It's taken my wife a while to get used to. She draws a clear line for where I can do my stuff so I have a separate workplace and freezer," he said.

Suwannakit began exploring taxidermy as part of his Masters in Fine Art and taught himself the craft through reading.

All the animals he uses are "recycled" — roadkill,

DEAD SET

- Taxidermy is derived from a Greek term meaning arrangement of the skin.
- Taxidermists must be familiar with anatomy, sculpture, painting, and tanning.
- It involves the art of preparing, stuffing and mounting the skins of animals for display.
- The oldest mounted animal in existence is a rhinoceros prepared about 1600 in Florence, Italy.
- Roque taxidermy is the creation of stuffed animals which do not really exist in nature, such as jackalopes, griffins or winged monkeys.

animals that died from natural causes, or euthanased livestock or feral animals — which he's found through emailing or contacts from pet shops.

Taxidermy has become very big in contemporary art, said curator of Transgression Michael Carolan.

Transgression is at Off the Kerb Gallery, Collingwood until August 3.
